Daily Assessment under Framework v7.0

Abu Dhabi | 7 April 2026 | 16:30 GST (T-11.5 hours to deadline)

Day 38 of the conflict | Framework v7.0 applied

Assessment classification: Confidential | Personal decision tool

Executive Summary

Resulting level: B (Prepare). Confidence: High. The structural trap is complete. All five Layer 1 preconditions are positive. Zero institutional brakes are in OK status. The degradation acceleration rule (v7.0) is active. Layer 3 signals 3a (nuclear-adjacent rhetoric) and institutional-actor exit signals are positive. The nuclear facility attack indicator is at Pre-Trigger (Amber). Kahn placement: Rung 16.

What carries the level: structure, not a single trigger event. No Level C trigger has fired. What separates the current situation from Level C is the absence of explicit nuclear rhetoric (3b negative), the absence of confirmed reactor damage (nuclear facility indicator at Amber, not Red), and the classification of all four brakes as Degraded rather than Failed. That gap can close within hours if the 20:00 ET deadline passes without a deal and is followed by execution of the threat.

Critical change: Layer 0 reassessment. The household exit-cost profile is reassessed from High to Moderate. Both partners arrived in Abu Dhabi in mid-January 2026. Bartje holds a senior position at FAB. However, the household has no deep financial commitments: the apartment is furnished and rented month-to-month (terminable end of April), both cars are leased short-term, there is minimal personal property beyond sunk-cost household items, and there are no long-term financial obligations. The employment contract is the only material commitment. Under these conditions, the evidentiary threshold for discretionary departure below Level C is lower than under a High profile.

Immediate actions required under Level B: Book flexible flights within 7 days. Move critical financial access outside the UAE. Brief Bartje's employer. Confirm Muscat routing. Activate deadline protocol.

Layer 0: Personal Context and Proportionality

Profile: Moderate (changed from High)

Reassessment rationale: the household arrived in Abu Dhabi in mid-January 2026 for Bartje's senior role at First Abu Dhabi Bank. That role carries reputational value and professional trust. However, the surrounding structure is light. The apartment is furnished, rented on a temporary basis, and can be exited by end of April. Both vehicles are short-term rentals. There are no property investments, no school enrolments, no dependants in-country, and no long-term financial commitments beyond the employment contract. Household items are sunk cost.

This profile is Moderate, not Low, because departure still carries a professional cost: it signals instability to an employer and could affect the trajectory of Bartje's role. But the financial and logistical barriers to departure are low. Under a Moderate profile, earlier discretionary action is permitted when the matrix is near a threshold. Layer 1 summary: Indicators 1–5 all positive. Indicator 6 negative. The structural trap is complete. The only missing element is the short-horizon accelerator.

Layer 2: Institutional Brakes

Layer 2 summary: 1 Failed (Congress), 3 Degraded (Pentagon, Facilitators, Coalition). Zero brakes in OK status.

V7.0 degradation acceleration rule active: all four brakes Degraded or worse with zero OK is treated as functionally equivalent to two Failed brakes for the purpose of the decision matrix. This is an additional pathway into Level B.

Layer 3: Threshold Events and Direct Precursors

AWS data centres damaged, one availability zone shut down. These are operational exits by institutional actors with direct knowledge of risk, consistent with the 8a definition.

Layer 3 Synthesis

Three Layer 3 signals are positive: 3a (nuclear-adjacent rhetoric), fresh insider warning signals, and institutional-actor exit signals. The nuclear facility attack indicator is at Pre-Trigger (Amber). 3b remains negative. Pattern break is negative.

The combination of 3a positive + zero brakes OK + nuclear facility at Pre-Trigger is the **new Level C pathway introduced in v7.0**. Under the current scoring, this pathway is active but requires all three elements simultaneously. Two of three are clearly met (3a positive, zero brakes OK). The third (nuclear facility at Pre-Trigger) is met but at Amber, not Red. The framework treats Amber as an elevation, not a trigger. Level C is therefore not yet reached through this path, but the distance is measured in a single event: one more strike closer to the reactor.

Layer 4: Kahn Escalation Placement

Previous rung: 14 (Hardening of Positions / Clash of Wills)

Current rung: 16 (Nuclear Ultimatums)

Next rung: 18–19 (Nuclear reference becomes operational / Terminal non-nuclear crisis)

What moved the crisis here: the accumulation of five weeks of conventional war without strategic result, a hard public deadline with no face-saving exit, Trump’s language shifting from targeted military operations to civilisational destruction (“a whole civilisation will die tonight”), the IDF’s operational preparation for infrastructure strikes (railway warning), and four strikes within 500m of an active nuclear reactor with IAEA warnings of radiological accident risk.

What could move the crisis higher: execution of the infrastructure threat after the deadline passes; a strike on Bushehr that damages the reactor or fuel storage (immediate escalation to Rung 21+ and Level D); explicit nuclear rhetoric by any head of state; or an Iranian retaliatory strike on Gulf energy/water infrastructure that produces mass civilian casualties, potentially triggering GCC military entry.

Specific Threat to Abu Dhabi

This section addresses threats directly relevant to the household’s location.

Ongoing kinetic activity

The UAE Ministry of Defence reported today (7 April) that air defences engaged 1 ballistic missile and 11 UAVs. Cumulative totals since 28 February: 520 ballistic missiles, 26 cruise missiles, and 2,221 UAVs engaged. Two soldiers and six civilians have been killed in UAE. Iranian attacks have hit Dubai International Airport (Terminal 3), Jebel Ali Port, AWS data centres, the French naval base near Zayed Port in Abu Dhabi, and the Fujairah Oil Industry Zone. Most intercepted, but the volume is sustained and the target categories are expanding.

Stargate/tech infrastructure threat

On 3 April, IRGC spokesperson Brigadier General Zolfaghari released a video threatening “complete and utter annihilation” of US and Israeli facilities in the region, specifically identifying the \$30 billion Stargate AI data centre under construction south of Abu Dhabi. The video included satellite imagery of the facility with the caption “Nothing stays hidden to our sight, though hidden by Google.” Iran has already damaged AWS data centres in the UAE, forcing availability zone shutdowns. The threat to Stargate is conditional (tied to US strikes on Iranian power infrastructure), but the deadline for that condition expires tonight.

IRGC escalation warning (7 April)

The IRGC’s Khatam al-Anbiya headquarters stated today that if attacks on civilian targets are repeated, retaliatory operations will be “much more devastating and widespread.” Al Jazeera reports the IRGC has said it will “respond outside the region and deprive US allies of oil and gas for many years” if US crosses “red lines.” This explicitly places Gulf energy infrastructure in the retaliation frame.

Assessment for Abu Dhabi

Abu Dhabi is within Iran’s demonstrated strike range. Iranian attacks on the UAE are ongoing daily. The threat to Stargate places Abu Dhabi-specific infrastructure in the named target set. If the deadline passes and the US executes the infrastructure threat, Iran’s stated conditional retaliation against Gulf energy and tech infrastructure becomes operative. The household is located in a city that is both a demonstrated and a threatened target.

Deadline Protocol (v7.0)

Active deadline: Trump’s 20:00 ET Tuesday 7 April (04:00 GST Wednesday 8 April)

Current position: T-11.5 hours (as of 16:30 GST)

Decision Matrix Application

Resulting level: B (Prepare)

Confidence: High

The level is reached through multiple convergent paths:

- Layer 1 indicators 1–5 all positive (structural preconditions fulfilled).
- 3a (nuclear-adjacent rhetoric) positive.
- Fresh insider warning signals active (IDF railway warning, State Dept DEPART NOW advisory, Rosatom evacuation).
- All four brakes Degraded or worse with zero OK (v7.0 degradation acceleration rule active, functionally equivalent to two Failed).
- Nuclear facility indicator at Pre-Trigger (Amber).
- Kahn Rung 16 (nuclear reference without use).

Why not Level C: 3b (explicit nuclear rhetoric) remains negative. The reactor at Bushehr has not been damaged. Fresh insider warning signals, while active, are not “new or materially widened within the last 72 hours” in the specific sense required for the Level C combination rule (the IDF railway warning is new today and qualifies as widened, but it is a conventional infrastructure warning, not nuclear-specific). The new v7.0 Level C pathway (Pre-Trigger + 3a + zero OK) is active but the framework treats Amber as elevation, not as equivalent to a confirmed nuclear facility strike.

What changes the level to C: any one of the following events would trigger Level C:

- Explicit nuclear rhetoric (3b) by any head of state.
- Confirmed damage to Bushehr reactor or fuel storage.
- Execution of the infrastructure threat combined with a second institutional-actor exit (beyond Rosatom), creating a fresh insider warning signal through the v7.0 combination rule.
- Pentagon chain of command moves to Failed (e.g., senior military resignation or sidelining in connection with infrastructure targeting orders).

Impact of Moderate Exit-Cost Profile

Under the previous High exit-cost profile, Level B permitted preparation but explicitly stated that departure was not yet justified. Under the reassessed Moderate profile, the framework allows earlier discretionary action when the matrix is near a threshold.

The matrix is near a threshold. Multiple Level C pathways are one event away from activation. The deadline expires in 11.5 hours. Under Moderate, the following additional discretionary actions are justified:

- Book confirmed (not just flexible) flights within 72 hours, including backup routing via Muscat.
- Begin pre-packing beyond the two-suitcase minimum: consolidate essential documents, medications, and irreplaceable items into a ready-to-move state.
- Initiate a quiet conversation with Bartje's employer about contingency leave. Frame as prudent personal planning, not as prediction.
- Confirm that rental termination can be executed on short notice (end of April or earlier with notice).
- Verify that car rental returns can be processed within 24 hours.

Required Actions

Immediate (before 22:00 GST today)

- Confirm flight availability: check Emirates, Etihad, and flydubai for AUH/DXB departures to Amsterdam within 72 hours and within 7 days. Book the most flexible option.
- Confirm Muscat routing: verify the Al Ain road crossing to Oman remains open. Download offline maps. Check Oman Air and SalamAir for MCT to AMS availability.
- Financial access: confirm that sufficient funds are accessible from a European bank account. If not, transfer today.
- Emergency contact: confirm NL contact knows the protocol, route, and check-in schedule.
- Vehicle fuel: verify both cars above 75%.
- Go-bags: both bags packed and ready. Include passports, cash (EUR and USD), chargers, medications, document copies.

Before T-6 assessment (22:00 GST)

- Brief Bartje on the framework assessment and the deadline protocol.
- Agree on the pre-decision: what will we do if the deadline passes with no deal?
- Set alarms for T-6 (22:00), T-1 (03:00), and T+1 (05:00) assessments.

Standing actions (maintained until further notice)

- Daily assessment at 08:00 GST.
- Monitor UAE MoD infographics, IAEA statements, and major wire services (Reuters, AP, Al Jazeera, CNN).
- Track Iranian attack patterns on UAE specifically: volume, target categories, and proximity to Abu Dhabi.
