

T+12 Post-Ceasefire Assessment

Escalation Risk Assessment under Framework v7.0

Abu Dhabi | 8 April 2026 | 16:00 GST | Day 40 of the conflict

Ceasefire announced 14 hours ago. Iranian attacks on the UAE ongoing.

KEY FINDING: The ceasefire does not cover the Iran-Gulf axis operationally. 17 ballistic missiles and 35 drones intercepted by UAE today.

Executive Summary

Resulting level: B (Prepare), upper boundary. Returned from mid-range.

Fourteen hours after the ceasefire announcement, the UAE Ministry of Defence reports intercepting 17 ballistic missiles and 35 drones from Iran today. Debris from a successful interception caused fires and injuries at the Habshan gas complex in Abu Dhabi, the country's largest gas processing facility. Al Jazeera confirms attacks on the UAE, Kuwait, and Bahrain under the headline "UAE, Kuwait, Bahrain report attacks despite Iran-US ceasefire." This is not a residual kill-chain effect. This is a continued campaign, 14 hours after both sides formally accepted a ceasefire.

Simultaneously, the first positive signal has emerged: MarineTraffic reports early vessel movements in the Strait of Hormuz. This is the first observable evidence that the Hormuz component of the ceasefire may be taking effect. The diplomatic track is intact: Pakistan confirmed Friday talks in Islamabad. Iraq's Iran-backed militias announced a two-week operational suspension.

The framework's assessment: the ceasefire exists on the US-Iran bilateral axis and is beginning to produce observable effects on Hormuz. But it does not exist operationally on the Iran-Gulf axis. The 48-hour observation window for Condition 1 (no Iranian attacks on the UAE) **cannot start**. The attacks are ongoing. Level B returns to its upper boundary.

Key Developments Since 10:00 GST

Continued attacks on the UAE (negative)

Khaleej Times reports the UAE intercepted 17 ballistic missiles and 35 drones on 8 April after the ceasefire announcement. At the Habshan gas complex in Abu Dhabi, debris from a successful interception caused fires and injured two Emiratis and one Indian national. This is the second incident at Habshan in recent days; the facility suffered "significant damage" on 3 April when one Egyptian national was killed.

Al Jazeera reports that Bahrain's Interior Ministry confirmed attacks injuring two people and causing a fire at energy facilities on Sitra Island. Kuwait also reported attacks. The attacks are confirmed by multiple international outlets (CNBC, Al Jazeera, Military.com, PBS, Khaleej Times).

Hormuz vessel movements (positive)

MarineTraffic, the maritime tracking service, reported early signs of vessel activity in the Strait of Hormuz following the ceasefire announcement. This is significant: it is the first observable, non-declaratory evidence that the Hormuz component of the ceasefire may be taking effect. However, Iran's formulation ("safe passage via coordination with Iran's Armed Forces") means this is managed traffic, not free passage. Iran and Oman reportedly plan to charge transit fees. The Strait is reopening under Iranian control, not returning to its pre-war state.

Iran's SNSC statement (concerning)

Iran's Supreme National Security Council issued a statement that included: **"This does not signify the termination of the war. Our hands remain upon the trigger, and should the slightest error be committed by the enemy, it shall be met with full force."** This is not ceasefire language. This is deterrence language. Iran is explicitly preserving the option to resume full operations at any moment.

The warlord question (analytical, significant)

PBS reports that "throughout the war, Iran's paramilitary Revolutionary Guard has called the shots in all decisions. Individual commanders have made decisions on what to strike and when, with the nation's political leadership sidelined." This externally validates the decentralisation hypothesis discussed in earlier analysis. The analytical question is whether the SNSC can enforce the ceasefire on IRGC field units, particularly those operating in the Gulf coastal region.

Three interpretations of the continued Gulf attacks remain plausible. First: the commandketen has not yet propagated fully (kill-chain delay). This becomes less credible with each passing hour beyond the 90-minute baseline established last night. Second: the attacks are deliberate policy, maintaining pressure on Gulf states as negotiating leverage for the Islamabad talks. Third: individual IRGC commanders are operating with delegated authority and are ignoring or reinterpreting the ceasefire order. All three interpretations lead to the same framework conclusion: the ceasefire does not protect this location.

Diplomatic track (intact)

- Pakistan confirmed Islamabad talks for Friday 10 April.
- Trump claims China helped push Iran toward the ceasefire.
- Islamic Resistance in Iraq (Iran-backed umbrella group) announced two-week operational pause.
- International reaction cautiously positive: UN, Australia, Japan call for compliance.
- Trump claims "total and complete victory" and says Iran's uranium will be "perfectly taken care of." No mechanism described.

Abu Dhabi internal measures

Abu Dhabi authorities detained 375 people for filming sites and spreading misinformation. This signals both the sensitivity of the security situation and the government's intent to control the narrative. It also means that independent verification of events on the ground is restricted.

Layer Assessment

Layer 0: Exit-cost profile

High. Standing default. Correctly maintained. One partner holds a senior, trust-based position in Abu Dhabi’s financial sector. The income position at stake is substantial. The ceasefire reinforces the High classification: voluntary departure during a ceasefire, when the professional environment is normalising, carries greater reputational cost than departure under active fire. The framework raises the evidentiary threshold for voluntary departure below Level C. It never overrides Level C or D.

Layer 1: Structural preconditions

Layer 2: Institutional brakes

Pentagon	DEGRADED	Ceasefire order followed. US offensive operations ceased. Pentagon executing de-escalation. But no institutional pushback visible against continued Israeli operations in Lebanon.
Facilitators	DEGRADED	Pakistan produced ceasefire. Islamabad talks confirmed. China reportedly helped push Iran. Egypt, Turkey involved. Functional channel. But Iran’s SNSC says “this does not signify the termination of the war.” The channel is producing process, not yet results.
Coalition	DEGRADED	International reaction cautiously positive. No ally imposing constraint. Israel excluded Lebanon. Qatar and Kuwait urge Iran to cease all hostilities. Coalition is reactive, not proactive.

Layer 2 summary: 0 Failed, 4 Degraded. Unchanged from 10:00 GST. The brakes are not improving further despite the ceasefire, because the ceasefire is not holding on the ground.

Layer 3: Threshold events

Layer 4: Kahn placement

Current: Rung 15 (Barely Controlled Ceasefire). The bilateral US-Iran ceasefire exists. Hormuz is showing early signs of reopening. But the Iran-Gulf axis remains at Rung 16-17: active missile and drone attacks on Gulf energy infrastructure, 14 hours after a ceasefire was announced. The crisis is split between two rungs depending on which axis you measure.

The Central Question: Does the Ceasefire Hold on the Ground?

This assessment must confront the question directly. As of 16:00 GST, 14 hours after the ceasefire:

- **On the US-Iran axis:** the ceasefire appears to be holding. US offensive operations have ceased. No new US or Israeli strikes on Iran reported today. Iran's SNSC accepted the ceasefire. Diplomatic track is active.
- **On the Iran-Gulf axis:** the ceasefire is not holding. 17 ballistic missiles and 35 drones were intercepted by the UAE today. Habshan gas complex hit. Bahrain, Kuwait also attacked. This is confirmed by multiple international sources.
- **On the Hormuz axis:** early positive signals. First vessel movements observed by MarineTraffic. But Iran controls passage and is imposing fees.

The framework's evidence discipline requires scoring based on observable facts. The observable fact is: missiles are still being fired at Abu Dhabi's energy infrastructure today. The ceasefire announcement has not changed that. Whether this is kill-chain delay, deliberate policy, or IRGC insubordination is analytically interesting but operationally irrelevant for the safety assessment. The missiles are real regardless of the reason.

Command authority question. PBS reports IRGC "individual commanders have made decisions on what to strike and when, with the nation's political leadership sidelined." The systematic elimination of Iranian military leadership by the US and Israel may have produced a fragmented command structure in which the SNSC cannot enforce a ceasefire on all operational units. If this is the case, the ceasefire is an agreement between entities that do not fully control the forces creating the threat. This is the most dangerous interpretation: not that the ceasefire is dishonest, but that it is sincere and insufficient.

Decision Matrix

Level: B (Prepare), upper boundary. Confidence: High.

Returned from mid-range. The 10:00 GST downgrade to mid-range was based on the ceasefire announcement and the initial cessation of hostilities. The 16:00 GST data shows that the cessation was partial. The Iran-Gulf axis is still active. Level B upper boundary is the correct position.

48-hour observation window: status

- **Condition 1 (no Iranian attacks on UAE for 48 hours): FAILING.** 17 ballistic missiles + 35 drones today. Habshan hit. The clock cannot start.
- **Condition 2 (Hormuz ship traffic): EARLY POSITIVE.** MarineTraffic reports first vessel movements. Monitoring continues.
- **Condition 3 (Islamabad talks): PENDING.** Confirmed for Friday. Not yet started.

Revised decision point

The original decision point was Thursday 10 April 08:00 GST. Given that Condition 1 is failing, the decision point shifts:

- **If Gulf attacks stop by tonight (8 April 20:00 GST):** the 48-hour clock starts. Decision point becomes Saturday 10 April 20:00 GST.
- **If Gulf attacks continue tomorrow:** the 48-hour clock cannot start. Maintain Level B upper boundary. Reassess the departure option for the weekend.
- **If a MOI alert is received:** execute shelter protocol. Reassess for Level C based on circumstances.

Actions

- Maintain all Level B preparations. Go-bags packed. Passports accessible. Vehicles fuelled.
- Contact Andrea and Huda. Confirm the contingency route remains available this week.
- Hold existing flight bookings. Do not release them.
- Monitor: UAE MoD updates every 2 hours. Hormuz vessel tracking (MarineTraffic). News on Islamabad talks confirmation. Any MOI alerts.
- Next full assessment: tomorrow 08:00 GST, or immediately if a MOI alert is received.

Notes	The ceasefire is real on the bilateral axis and beginning to show on Hormuz. It is not real on the Iran-Gulf axis. Seventeen ballistic missiles and thirty-five drones is not a residual effect. It is a campaign. The framework scores what it observes. It observes missiles. Level B, upper boundary.

Seventeen ballistic missiles and thirty-five drones hit the UAE's air defence envelope today. Until that number is zero for 48 consecutive hours, the level stays where it is. The discipline is to measure what is observable and to resist the temptation to score the hope instead of the evidence.
